There are more than 1.4 million Vietnamese in the United States, with 200,000 living in the San Francisco Bay Area. Some of the health disparities faced by Vietnamese Americans are:

- Breast cancer is the most common cancer among Vietnamese American women, who underutilize breast cancer screening.
- Cervical cancer rate is twice as high among Vietnamese Americans as White Americans.
- Chronic Hepatitis B is found in 1 out of 7 Vietnamese Americans, leading to a liver cancer rate that is 9 times higher than White Americans.
- Lung cancer is the most common cancer among Vietnamese American men, who currently have a smoking prevalence that is two times higher than White Americans.
- Colorectal cancer is the third leading cancer among Vietnamese American women and men, but colorectal cancer screening rates remain low.

Mr. Christopher N. H. Jenkins and his sister Mrs. Satia Jenkins Bernen grew up outside Philadelphia in Pennsylvania. Throughout their lives, they traveled extensively, lived simply and cared about other peoples' well-being. They worked tirelessly to help the needy and the underserved. As a young man, Mr. Jenkins volunteered in Vietnam and thereafter developed a life-long interest in the Vietnamese community.

In 1986, along with Stephen J. McPhee, MD, Chris co-founded *Sức Khỏe Là Vàng!* (Health is Gold! aka the Vietnamese Community Health Promotion Project) at the University of California San Francisco, an organization that develops and evaluates public health programs in the areas of health promotion and disease (especially cancer) prevention, in collaboration with Vietnamese in other communities throughout the United States.



Mr. Jenkins was a visionary and conscientious health researcher who developed, conducted and evaluated many interventions which have made a significant impact on the health status of the Vietnamese American community.

Unfortunately, Mr. Jenkins passed away unexpectedly in 2001 at the height of his career. Mrs. Satia Jenkins Bernen, who so admired and supported her brother's work, left as a bequest an endowment to the **Sức Khỏe Là Vàng!** Project to continue her brother's legacy and to ensure continued support for empowering the Vietnamese American community with knowledge to improve their health status.

As of today, the *Sức Khỏe Là Vàng!*Project has implemented nearly 50
research projects funded by Federal,
State and non-government agencies, and
published more than 80 scientific papers
related to major health topics of the
Vietnamese Americans. Its research
findings and intervention activities
continue to benefit the Vietnamese American community.
